

### One Bridge of Hope family's journey


Alisa explains that, "Before Bridge of Hope, I could not afford a car and rent. In order to get to work, I had to have a car and then couldn't afford to pay rent. If I paid rent, I couldn't afford to have the car to drive to work. I had relationship struggles with family members and never enough money to survive."

She continues, "Bridge of Hope has made it possible to have a car, a job, a home, and friends! I love having a network of support from my mentoring friends. They encourage me as I help my children to succeed in school and pursue my own dreams and goals."

The importance of permanent housing and supportive relationships – for ending family homelessness

Dr. Ellen Bassuk (physician and noted researcher on family homelessness) says that, "The data suggest that solutions to family homelessness in the current housing market require an increase in the supply of decent affordable housing, income maintenance, and assistance from social welfare agencies focused on **rebuilding supportive relationships**."
